- Many residents committed to public service: James H. Dendy; Monroe McDonald; Stiles Plumer Dendy.
- Many residents committed to community service: Col. Jaynes – lawyer, writer; James Stribling – Clemson University; Dr. William Doyle and Lila Stribling Doyle his wife and founder of Oconee Medical Center; David Warren Stribling – organized Blue Ridge Electric; Will McDonald.
- Members served in Confederate Service.
- Early ecumenical fellowship between Methodist and Presbyterian Church in Richland.
- Home of Richland Academy which sent students on to colleges and universities.
- Five passenger trains a day Atlanta and Charlotte thru Richland in 1873.
- Booming town in 1882 with nine businesses.
- Train carrying Pres. Roosevelt's body from Warm Spring, GA to Washington, DC passed through Richland in 1945.
- Plantations size ranged from 1,000 to 5,900 acres.
